Unfortunately, Maria and Little Baby's situation is not unique. At the Placer SPCA, we see people give up beloved pets because of emergency veterinary care, job loss, foreclosure, or because they are between homes.

Many people make personal sacrifices for their pets, going without luxuries in order to ensure their pets are well cared for. Some try to keep pets while they live in a car or stay with friends or relatives. Ultimately, however, many are brought to us when all other options run out.

The companion animal welfare experts at the Placer SPCA realized it simply did not make sense to stand by while an animal's loving forever family was forced to give him up due to temporary financial difficulties.

With generous support from the community, including a grant from the Citizen's Benefit Fund awarded by the Roseville Grants Advisory Commission, the Placer SPCA is now able to offer assistance to pet owners to help with vet bills, pet deposits on rentals, temporary boarding, and other specialized care.

This makes sense not only for the people who will be able to keep their four-legged family members, but also for our organization. This program will help prevent overcrowding at our facility and save the cost of day-to-day care for a number of animals. The SOS fund will also help us cover the cost of caring for the increasing number of animals brought to us by owners who would not be able to keep them even with financial assistance.
